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Background

- Few healthcare resources to relieve the burden of musculoskeletal (MSK) disorders in developing nations
- Insufficient data exist to describe how, where and in what context people currently seek or find relief

WSC Research Efforts: Team I

- Longitudinal data collection at the Shoshong and Mahalapye World Spine Care Clinics
- Qualitative study: focused ethnography
- Cross-sectional epidemiological study (household surveys)

Longitudinal data collection

- Opportunity to describe rich cohort of people and reasons for seeking healthcare at WSC clinics
- Jan-Mar 2013, concerted effort to establish protocols and instruments (special thanks to volunteer, Michelle Boyle!)
- Opportunities for cross-cultural comparisons
- MoH human subjects application in preparation
- Retrospective review to summarise patients seen to date
- Prospective data collection, training the local workforce to continue these efforts

Focused ethnography

- A focused ethnography emphasizes anthropological theory and methods while limiting the scope and duration of fieldwork to a specific program-relevant research problem
- Research approach to explore the meanings that people attribute to particular life events, including health and illness

Broad Aim

 To examine the cultural, social, clinical and organisational characteristics for the burden of living with and caring for people living with MSK conditions in Village Shoshong

Focused ethnography

- April 2013, on the ground to build relations, prepare contractual arrangements, pre-test interview questions, finalise translations, design optimal recruitment strategies
- May-Jun 2013, finalise MoH human subjects application
- Oct-Nov 2013 and Apr-May 2014, primary data collection
- 2014-2015, prepare manuscripts and HH survey
 - Secure funding to hire and train local workers for HH surveys

Cross-sectional household surveys

- Informed by early research efforts
- Culturally sensitive and feasible survey
- Local workers
 - Leadership on-the-ground for training and oversight
 - Anticipate hiring 12-15 workers
 - 3,000-4,000 household surveys
 - 3-4 months employment
 - Every two years

WSC Research Team I

- Describe prevalence & burden of MSK disorders
- Estimate the numbers & types of providers needed to serve the community for spinal health
- Inform public health policy for the most effective strategies to improve quality of life & ability to work
- Incorporate community values into sustainable partnerships
